We alighted from the bus only to find we were lost. We approached building-construction workers, (none could speak english), they stayed with us for 1/2 hour explaining how to get there. All went well and eventually we arrived there by foot, to a very eye opening experience. A visit to Mont St Michel by bus was had, but I found the place too commercialized, better visiting other sites in France. We flew from Paris to Vancouver for a week (beautiful city) and then home.

I recently spent the day with my 95 year-old aunt, Sr. Mary Constance (Monica) Fitzgerald in Los Angeles. Her youngest living brother, Fr. Bill Fitzgerald, has been a Redemptorist missionary in Brazil for 41 years, having gone there in early 1968. I found this article about him in a Re-

demptorist publication from a couple years ago, and thought it might be interesting for the Ryan Rag, especially the part about the Escola Solidaria Anna Ryan school that has been started there in rural Brazil.

Fr. Bill is currently here in California for three months R&R, and to celebrate his 91st birthday. He will return to Brazil and his missionary work in early May. He has been a living example of justice and courage for me over the years. I thought his story would be inspiring for Clan Ryan members.

Gaeilge Language

The language spoken by the Celts in Ireland was Celtic, a variant of the Celtic languages which were used across Europe. In the British Isles, there were at least two dialects in use: *Brittonic* (P-Celtic) which was spoken in southern Britain and France, and *Goidelic* (Q-Celtic) which was spoken in Ireland and northern Britain. Brittonic is the root of modern Welsh, Cornish and Breton. Goidelic is the root of modern Irish and Scots-Gaelic. Brittonic and Goidelic must have been heavily influenced by the Bronze Age languages of Ireland. The first written Irish appeared in the fifth century, around the same time as the initial Christianisation of Ireland. Called Ogham script, it consists of a series of grooves on the corner of a stone. Each combination of grooves represents a different letter of the Latin alphabet, and a number of Ogham stones have been found in Ireland and in Wales. Those in Ireland are mostly along the south coast. Usually they give the name of a person or ancestor and were probably commemorative. The picture on the left shows the Ogham stone at Coolma-

Seamus said, 'Well, I had just got Bessie into the trailer and I was driving down the road....'



Fr Bill's vocation with the 'Invasion People' and 'The Excludeds' of Brazil

For most of his 40 years in Brazil, Fr. Bill, now 89 years old, has lived and traveled with a group of people known as the "invasion people," squatters who construct "homes" wherever they can and from whatever materials they can find, only to have them demolished and the people forced from their shelters once they are discovered by the authorities. Fr. Bill has also been living with and helping a group of people known as the "excludeds," trash pickers who live in mud huts and try to make their "living" by digging through garbage looking for recyclable materials to sell. .

Fr. Bill has started a small school for these folks; the children of the trash pickers come in the mornings and the adults in the afternoons. To show their gratitude, the people wanted to name the school after Fr. Bill; he refused. He suggested instead the school be named after his mother. And so it is named, "The Escola Solidaria Anna Ryan School." (Sent to us courtesy of Sr. Anne Fitzgerald, Fr. Bill's sister)

Despite being incredibly busy and with only infrequent access to email. Fr. Bill was good enough to answer a few questions for us...

"When did you realize you wanted to become a priest?"

My taking up and following the path to the priesthood was really a matter of taking the path of least resistance. Since Adam and Eve, practically, my entire family had been monsignors and priests and seminarians and religious. I entered the minor seminary in Oakland, California, in 1932, at the advanced age of 14. What had gone on before that? Only God knows. It depends on with whom you are talking. Really, I should just refer you to God. Only He knows.

" Why a Redemptorist?"

San Bernardino, California (where I was brought up) at that time was the Siberia of the archdiocese of Los Angeles. Redemptorist fire-and-brimstone missionaries never gave up on this bottomless font of every kind of sinner. Also, one of the first pieces of mail I ever received was a Redemptorist publication.

After 40 years, how would you describe the faith of your "excludeds?"

It took me a God-awful long time to get the message that I was the first in line of those whom I was to change. By the grace of God, I have come full circle. I still do the customary service of sacraments and ritual and liturgy for those who need and want that. But I find myself more and more in a pre-Christian ambience.

I hesitate to try to change the religion of the excludeds, those with whom I live and have my being, those excluded by government, society and the Christian churches. Their 'religion' is not mine - a magic religion, miraculous combinations of prayers and rituals and promises and penitences.

Yet if it works, don't fix it. It's that "religion" that makes it possible for these people to be 'somebodies', makes it possible for them to live in an ambience of death, to hope in an ambience of despair, to be hospitable when there's nothing to share except their goodness

and love and playful readiness to celebrate at any time and without the necessity of having an occasion for it; to be tranquil in an ambience of stress.

These people have no need of psychologists; don't have high blood pressure, don't suffer strokes; those who try to escape this non-life whether by outright suicide or by its other forms of despair, like drugs or sex or capitalism, are those who have given up on this type of 'religion.'

Fr Bill is the son of Anna Luby Ryan Fitzgerald, He is currently in California, preparing to celebrate his 91st birthday with his 93 and 95 year old sisters, his nieces and nephews, grandnieces and grandnephews.

COLCANNON WITH GUINNESS STEW

Preparation Time: 30mins: Cook Time 150 mins

- 50g (1/3 cup) plain flour
- 1kg gravy beef, cut into 3cm pieces
- 60ml (1/4 cup) olive oil
- 3 carrots, peeled, coarsely chopped
- 1 brown onion, halved, coarsely chopped
- 2 garlic cloves, crushed
- 2 tbs tomato paste
- 250ml (1 cup) Guinness beer
- 250ml (1 cup) beef stock
- 2 sprigs fresh thyme
- 2 dried bay leaves
- 1/4 cup coarsely chopped fresh continental parsley
- 2 tsp finely grated lemon rind

COLCANNON

- 1kg sebago potatoes, peeled, chopped
- 40g butter, chopped
- 1/4 (about 500g) savoy cabbage, hard core removed, coarsely chopped
- 4 green shallots, ends trimmed, thinly sliced
- 125ml (1/2 cup) milk

Method

1. Preheat oven to 180°C. Place the flour in a bowl and season with salt and pepper. Add beef and turn to coat.
2. Heat half the oil in a large frying pan over medium-high heat. Add half the beef and cook for 2-5 minutes each side or until browned. Transfer to a 2.5L (10-cup) capacity ovenproof dish. Repeat with the remaining beef, reheating pan between batches.
3. Heat the remaining oil in the pan over medium-high heat. Add the carrot, onion and garlic and cook for 5 minutes or until the onion is soft. Add the tomato paste and cook for 1 minute. Add the Guinness, stock, thyme and bay leaves and bring to the boil. Transfer to the ovenproof dish. Bake, covered, for 2 hours or until meat is tender. Season with salt and pepper.
4. Meanwhile, to make the colcannon, cook the potato in a saucepan of boiling water for 15 minutes or until tender. Drain and return to pan. Use a potato masher to mash until smooth. Heat butter in a frying pan over medium heat until foaming. Add the cabbage and shallot and cook for 3-4 minutes or until tender (do not brown). Add the cabbage mixture and milk to the potato and stir to combine. Season with salt and pepper.
5. Divide the colcannon among serving plates. Top with the stew and sprinkle with parsley and lemon rind to serve.

IRISH SODA BREAD

Prep Time; 25mins
Cook Time; 10 mins

Ingredients:

- ½cup sugar
- 4cups flour
- 2tsp baking powder
- 1tsp baking soda
- ¾tsp salt
- 1 cup sour cream
- 3 cups raisins
- 1 tbsp caraway seeds
- 2 eggs, lightly beaten
- 1 ¼cups buttermilk

Preparation:

Preheat oven to 350°. Grease a 9" round cake pan with solid shortening and set aside. In a large mixing bowl, combine flour (reserving 1 tablespoon), sugar, baking powder, baking soda. Salt, raisins and caraway seeds. In a small bowl, combine eggs, buttermilk and sour cream and beat until smooth. Stir the liquid mixture into flour mixture just until flour is moistened. Knead dough in bowl about 10;-12 times. The dough will be stick. Place the dough in the prepared pan and pat down. Cut a 4 x ¾" deep slash in the top of the bread and dust with reserved flour. Bake in a preheated 350° oven for 65 - 75 mins: remove from pan and place on wire rack to cool.

CROCKPOT IRISH LAMB STEW

Prep Time: 25minutes
Cook Time: 10 hours

Ingredients:


- 1lb boneless lean lamb
- 2tsp salt
- 2 onions, sliced
- ¼ tsp pepper
- 1 bay leaf
- 2 carrots, cut into 1inch chunks
- 4 potatoes, peeled and quartered
- ¼ cup quick cooking tapioca
- 3 cups water

250grams frozen peas, thawed

Preparation: Cut lamb into 1 ½inch cubes and season with salt and pepper. Place vegetables, except peas, in bottom of crockpot. Sprinkle with tapioca and place lamb on top. Pour water over all; add bay leaf. Cover and cook on low for 10-12 hours. Add peas last 30 mins of cooking. Serves 8-10

It was with a deep sense of shock and horror that we learned of the devastating Firestorm which engulfed and destroyed such a large portion of Victoria. Our Sympathy and Support goes to the victims. Many amazing stories of survival are emerging, whilst the tragic loss of life has climbed to an unprecedented 208 persons.

Whilst we recognize all people affected, we make special mention of the Ryan's.

The President of our Victorian Sept, Ryan Clan Vic, John Ryan and wife Julie, who live in Kilmore, were fortunate to have escaped unscathed.

Not so lucky was another John Ryan, a Glenburn resident whose home and property was left a burnt out shell but was fortunate to be able to offer shelter to his neighbours. Also affected were Mark and Helen Ryan, from Healsville.

Alan Ryan, was a survivor of the inferno that wiped Marysville off the map. He evacuated with about two minutes to spare and watched from the Buxton-Marysville Road as the town was swallowed by the flames. He described it as a big cauldron that was boiling and running over the lip, a cloud which was the fire front and the wind could be seen sort of rolling with alarming speed.

Vet nurse Fiona Ryan from Currumbin Sanctuary, originally from Victoria, is assisting with veterinary care, at Healsville

Sanctuary in the Yarra Valley. More than a million animals are thought to have died. The Healsville wildlife team has been working day and night taking care of animals with third degree burns and severe injuries.

The wonderful Celtic, artists featuring in the Celtic Bushfire Appeal Concert, have given their time and talents to raise funds for the victims of the fires. The Kilmore Celtic Festival Committee are working hard to make it a success and the concert, with a few items to raffle is hoped to raise about \$10,000. They can only seat approx. 300.

As many members are unable to attend the concert, perhaps we could each send a \$30 dollar donation in lieu of a ticket and our presence, thereby assisting in that way. It would give potential to raise \$3,000. Clan Ryan Qld is sending a donation commensurate with our finances.

I URGE ALL WHO HAVE THE MEANS AND THE DESIRE, - TO DONATE. PLEASE KEEP THE SPIRIT OF KINSHIP AND MATESHIP ALIVE IN AUSTRALIA. AND HELP OUR FELLOW RYANS.

Sadly the State of Victoria continues to burn to the present day, and Kilmore is still under threat. Our prayers and thoughts are with our Victorian family, may God keep them safe from further harm.

The ANZAC spirit

The legend of ANZAC was born on 25 April 1915, and was reaffirmed in eight months' fighting on Gallipoli. Although there was no military victory, the Australians displayed great courage, endurance, initiative, discipline, and mateship. Such qualities came to be seen as the ANZAC spirit. Many saw the ANZAC spirit as having been

born of egalitarianism and mutual support. According to the stereotype, the ANZAC rejected unnecessary restrictions, possessed a sardonic sense of humour, was contemptuous of danger, and proved himself the equal of anyone on the battlefield. Australians still invoke the ANZAC spirit in times of conflict, danger and hardship.

The name Ryan is prominent in Australian Decorations



Victoria Cross: The Victoria Cross is the highest award for acts of bravery in wartime. It was instituted in 1856 by Queen Victoria and made retrospective to 1854 to cover the period of the Crimean War. It is possible for any serviceman to obtain this award.

In the initial assault Ryan was one of the first to reach the enemy's defences and his actions inspired others to overcome the garrison. When the Germans launched a strong and determined counter attack Ryan organized and led a party of men in a bomb and bayonet charge against a party of enemy bombers who had infiltrated the rear of the position. Ryan's small party succeeded in killing the first three Germans encountered and then Ryan rushed the remainder with bombs and drove them back across No Man's Land. His action enabled the attack to be broken and the trench was retaken. In this action Ryan was wounded in the shoulder.

THERE ARE A FEW THINGS THAT CAN BE DONE IN TIMES OF GRAVE EMERGENCIES. YOUR MOBILE PHONE CAN ACTUALLY BE A LIFE SAVER OR AN EMERGENCY TOOL FOR SURVIVAL.

Check out the things that you can do with it:

FIRST

Emergency
The Emergency Number worldwide for Mobile is 112.

If you find yourself out of the coverage area of your mobile network and there is an emergency, Dial 112 and the mobile will search any existing network to establish the emergency number for you, and interestingly this number 112 can be dialed even if the keypad is locked. Try it out.

SECOND

Have you locked your keys in the car? Does your car have remote keyless entry? This may come in handy someday. Good reason to own a cell phone: If you lock your Keys in the car and the spare keys are at home, call someone at home on their mobile phone from your cell phone.

Hold your cell phone about a foot from your car door and have the person at your home press the unlock button, holding it near the mobile phone on their end.

Your car will unlock. Saves someone from having to drive your keys to you.

Distance is no object. You could be hundreds of miles away, and if you can reach someone who has the other 'remote' for your car, you can unlock the doors (or the trunk). Try it out

THIRD

Hidden Battery Power imagine your mobile battery is very low. To activate, press the keys *3370# Your mobile will restart with this reserve and the Instrument will show a 50% increase in battery. This reserve will get charged when you charge your mobile next time.

FOURTH

How to disable a STOLEN mobile phone? To check your Mobile phone's serial number, Key in the following digits on your phone: *# 0 6 # A 15 digit code will appear on the screen. this number is unique to your handset.

Write it down and keep it somewhere safe. When your phone get stolen, you can phone Your service provider and give them this code, they will then be able to block your handset


The **Military Medal** (until 1993) was awarded to NCO personnel of British Army and other services, also to personnel of Commonwealth countries, for bravery in battle on land. Established on 25th March 1916, it was the OR's equivalent to the Military Cross, awarded to commissioned officers and WOs (although WOs could be awarded the MM), although it took precedence below that decoration as well as the Distinguished Conduct Medal, also awarded to non-commissioned members of the Army. Recipients of the Military Medal are entitled to use the post-nominal letters "MM". In 1993, the Military Medal was discontinued, and since then the Military Cross has been awarded to personnel of all ranks

During the first advance of the 60th Battalion at Villers-Bretonneux France, on the 24th April, the NCO in charge of the guns became a casualty. Ryan took control of the situation and under heavy shelling and machine gun fire commanded his team, leading them forward and into position.

On the morning of the 25th April, Ryan again took command and successfully advanced his team. On arrival at their new position, Ryan collected some captured German machine guns and brought them into action.

Later when the enemy counter-attacked and the Anzac's own guns were blown out by shell fire, Albert went forward and inflicted severe casualties on the enemy with the captured guns.

THE SYMBOL OF THE RSL



This badge is a symbol of a readiness at all times to render service to Queen and Country, and to former comrades. It is a time-honoured emblem – one that has been worn with a deep sense of pride by the most revered in our land, and one that glorifies the coats of all privileged

to wear it. Neither wealth, nor influence, nor social standing can purchase the badge, which may be worn in honour only by those who have rendered service in Her Majesty's armed forces.

'A & NZAC'

Two Australian Sergeants, Little and Millington had cut a rubber stamp with the initials 'A & NZAC' for the purpose of registering papers at the Corps headquarters, situated in Shepherd's Hotel, Cairo. When a code name was requested for the Corps, a British officer, a Lt. White, suggested ANZAC. Little later claimed that he made the original suggestion to White. It was in general use by January 1915
