- Make sure your mixing bowl, beater and machine are clean and ready for use.
- Add the butter & sugars(and treacle) to the mixing bowl.
- Cream the butter & sugars(and treacle) together, using the beater, on a high speed until light.
- Stop the machine & give the beater & bowl a scrape down using a plastic scraper.
- Add the eggs slowly on a medium speed so as not to curdle the mixture.
- Sieve the flour (and spices together).
- Add the flour (and spices) gradually on a low speed.
- Stop the machine and scrape down the beater & bowl once more.
- Add the fruit gradually on a low speed (if you like you can leave the dried fruit to soak a few days before with a little sherry or brandy etc).
- Turn off the machine.
- Give the mixture a final turn with your clean hands or a wooden spoon to make sure it's properly mixed through.
 - Add the mixture to the tin, leveling & smoothing the top with the back of a spoon or wet closed fingers.
- Place into the middle of the oven at 150°C / 300°F / Gas mark 2 for the time given above for your tin size.
- Check the cake after the allotted time using a skewer...place the skewer into the middle of the cake if it comes out clean then the cake is done. If it needs a little more time pop it back in for another ten or fifteen minutes...if it starts burning then it's overdone or your oven is too hot!!
- Remove from the oven ...leave the cake in the tin on the top of the oven or on the side on a cooling rack to cool down.
- When cold tip the cake out of the tin and remove the first layer of paper leaving the greaseproof on the cake...you may add your brandy or sherry or rum to the cake and then wrap up in more greaseproof paper and then a sheet of aluminium foil.
- Store in a cool dry place for a while to mature until needed for decoration.

Method

- Weigh out all the ingredients into suitable containers so they are to hand when needed.
- Before starting mixing make sure you have lined the correct tin and turned on the oven. 150°C / 300°F / Gas mark 2
- Make sure the butter is left out of the fridge for a while before use, this will help stop the mixture from curdling later when adding the eggs. The eggs should also be at room temperature before using them and not taken straight from the fridge.

Consumer Warning Cont..... "After careful consideration we decided to issue an early warning and we hope that prevented people losing money on airline tickets or even worse ending up in a predicament where they were stranded abroad without a return flight seat."

In addition to cheaper-flights.com.au Queensland Police this week outed three other dodgy flight websites: cheapflight-only.net, onlycheapflights.net and flisave.com. The Commissioner is also recommending that consumers avoid these sites.

"Do not make bookings with flisave.com which immediately rings alarm bells be-

cause it only accepts wire transfer payments which are not traceable. The cheap-flightonly.net and onlycheapflights.net accounts appear to have been suspended but should also be avoided," she said.

"In general when making travel bookings online, be alert to unusually cheap fares or offers to give you airline tickets before you have to pay. If it seems too good to be true it usually is.

"Consumers in any doubt about a travel booking can contact us to check on the details of the agent they're dealing with. Remember if you deal with a licensed travel agent in Australia you have a higher level of protection, through the Travel Compensation Fund."

Telephone scam warning

Ryan Rag December 2010

Police wish to advise the community to be extremely cautious when taking telephone calls from people claiming to be from consumer and government offices.

A number of incidents have been reported to police recently where scammers are calling residential addresses identifying themselves as a representative of a genuine banking institution or representatives of 'bank reclaim expert' companies.

According to Detective Superintendent Brian Hay, the scammers call the victim and get them to recite their personal details including, full name, date of birth, address, telephone number and the banking institution they are with to give the impression they are from a genuine institution.

"These scams relate to the overpayment of tax and/or bank fees and offer a refund of these overpayments if the victim pays a fee, normally between \$200 and \$400," said Detective Superintendent Brian Hay.

"The caller often asks the victim to attend a post office where the fee can be paid, usually via a money transfer service."

WA consumer warning backed by QLD Police.

An early warning from WA's consumer watchdog last month about a bogus airfare website has led Queensland Police to issue a similar caution today.

Consumer Protection warned Western Australians to cease using the website cheaper-flights.com.au on October 29 and Queensland Police has now followed suit, naming the site as a scam.

The agency previously advised that cheaper-flights.com.au was wrongly claiming to be based in Australia, falsely using an ABN number belonging to a WA travel company and selling tickets for an airline it was not authorised to represent.

Commissioner Anne Driscoll believes issu-

"We have also seen similar scams relating to carbon offsets and want to remind the community to be extremely cautious if contacted by a person purporting to represent any bank or government organisation."

Members of the community should not rely on the contact details provided by the caller and are instead encouraged to always conduct their own research and personally initiate contact directly with the institution or company.

"The public is reminded to not confirm personal identification details with the caller but to report this type of scam to the appropriate authorities," said Detective Superintendent Brian Hay. Scams can be reported via the 'report a scam' page on SCAMwatch or by calling 1300 795 995. **Anyone with information which could assist police with their investigations should contact Crime Stoppers anonymously via 1800 333 000 or crimestoppers.com.au 24hrs a day. Crime Stoppers is a charitable community volunteer organisation working in partnership with the Queensland Police Service.**

ing an interim warning before investigations had concluded has prevented many people falling victim.

"We were hearing from WA consumers who were concerned about the credentials of the site after seeing adverts for it through social media and obtaining quotes for up to 50 per cent lower than market rate prices," she said.

"All the leads our WA ScamNet branch followed up suggested that it was scam, particularly the fact that cheaper-flights.com.au was wrongly quoting the ABN of a legitimate WA company, had no physical address in Australia and was operating from overseas.

Wealthy entrepreneur Gerry Ryan's five-year plan



lands Melbourne Cup win

Another Melbourne Cup, another wealthy winner. Gerry Ryan, who was valued at \$180 million earlier this year and owns one of Australia's biggest caravan businesses, yesterday fulfilled a lifelong dream by winning the Melbourne Cup with French horse Americain.

Ryan, who owns the Melbourne-based caravan giant Jayco, just missed the cut-off for this year's BRW Rich 200 list, and was listed as a contender with a \$180 million fortune.

Ryan is perhaps best known as one of the biggest individual supporters of sport in Australia. Jayco has been at various times a sponsor of Australian cycling events and teams, basketball teams (particularly women's), St Kilda Football Club and the Melbourne Storm rugby league team, where Ryan was a director.

But horse racing has always been a passion for the businessman. Five years ago, he and

fellow entrepreneur Kevin Bamford – who owns Melbourne company Labelmakers – decided they would try to get a runner in the Melbourne Cup.

"We are mates from the Carbine Club and five years ago Kevin and I sat down and he told me how he experienced a runner in the Cup," Ryan said yesterday.

Their first two attempts went awry – a colt died in a paddock accident and a mare wasn't up to Melbourne Cup grade.

Ryan, who has raced horses in France, then hit upon a plan to import a French stayer who was pre-qualified for the Melbourne Cup and which they knew could run the distance.

They found Americain and bought him for \$225,000. The horse had performed well in France before racing in America without success, but Ryan and Bamford saw an opportunity.

"He'd shown bad form in America but if you discounted that form he had excellent form," Ryan said.



THE Melbourne Cup is in the kitbag but it could be just the start for French stayer Americain. Next stop will be next month's Hong Kong Vase, and once he returns home to France a decision will be made whether to chase the Prix de l'Arc de Triomphe or another Melbourne Cup. Maybe even both.

"It is amazing how creative you become around midnight," owner Gerry Ryan said.

"The trainer [Alain de Royer-Dupre] was very noncommittal but even he was talking about the Arc [de Triomphe]. He is a very cautious man by nature, only after he won the group 2 at Deauville he said, 'We are coming here [to the Melbourne Cup].'"

Royer-Dupre has won the Arc with Dalakhani in 2003 and Zarkava in 2008. It would fit his pattern of giving stayers three or four weeks between runs. Americain would have to enter quarantine the day after the Arc if he were to defend his Melbourne Cup crown, but that is a decision for next year.

"I would personally like to come back here, but to have an Arc runner would be something else

again," Ryan said. "We need a fair handicapper to come back here. The problem would be quarantine. We would have one day's grace to get into it if he was to run in the Arc but that decision can wait."

Ryan was just happy to soaking up the Melbourne Cup success yesterday but confirmed there would be a stopover on the way back to Royer-Dupre's Chantilly stables. "Hong Kong here we come," he said. "Alain and Gerald [Mosse] won the Vase last year, and it is a very nice race."

The Vase is a race the French have dominated at Hong Kong's international race day. Mosse rode the Aga Khan's Daryakana, a three-year-old filly, to victory last year.

"I was just lucky Americain wasn't there," Mosse said yesterday. "I'm looking forward to international day with this horse [Americain] and hopefully some others."

Mosse was presented with his Wirth whip by Billy Smith, who won the 100th Cup on Hi Jinx. It was first presented to the Melbourne Cup-winning jockey in 1888

The race that stops the Nation

Survey claims Melbourne Cup costs \$1 billion in lost productivity – but it's all worth it for employers The Melbourne Cup might be known as the race that stops the nation, but it's also the race that stops Australian workers.



While Melbourne workers enjoy a public holiday on Cup Day, a survey of 889 workers around the country found employees take an average of 3.5 hours off work to enjoy the race and associated festivities. According to recruitment and HR consultancy Randstad, the cost of that lost productivity is around \$1 billion, based on ABS statistics that indicate there are approximately 11, 276, 100 full-time employees in Australia, earning an average wage of \$31.40 per hour.

The survey showed 12.1% of workers choose to take the entire day off, while about 47% take part in some form of office-organised event, such as sweepstakes (something 38% of workers get involved in) or an office function (25% of workers). Just 15% only stop long enough to watch the race before returning to work.

However, employers who might be throwing their hands up in disgust at the thought of all this lost productivity should consider using the event to their advantage.

At a time when employers want to improve staff retention, some Cup Day fun could be the perfect way of getting the team together – particularly if your staff are going to be distracted anyway.

Randstad CEO Deb Loveridge agrees. “While employers should be aware of the Cup’s overall effect on their businesses’ bottom line, the long-term benefits outweigh the short-term costs,” she says. “In fact, employers may damage their company culture, reputation and retention if they don’t get involved, such is the passion, excitement and anticipation around the Cup.”

Oh, and if you’re organising the Melbourne Cup sweep this year, keep in mind that torrential rain is forecast for Melbourne over the weekend.

If you can “organise” things so you can get a mudlark such as Descarado in the office sweep, you could recoup the costs of any lost productivity pretty quickly!

Help bring back the Richmond birdwing butterfly by planting the Richmond birdwing vine!

Pararistolochia praevenosa

The Richmond birdwing butterfly

The Richmond birdwing was once abundant near Brisbane and is the largest and most beautiful butterfly in Southeastern Queensland. Today it is rarely seen in urban southeastern Queensland where it has suffered from a decline in abundance of its only caterpillar food, the Richmond birdwing vine.

Ecology

This vine grows particularly well after rain and during autumn and winter when there are few or no caterpillars to feed on them. Only midges pollinate the flowers (even some midges have their purpose!). The capsules begin to form in spring, slowly expand to ripen over summer and turn golden orange in autumn then fall unopened from the vine. Australian brush turkeys help germination by burying the seeds with their claws as they feed on the fruit. The vines have become rare and there is a need to plant this vine in gardens and reserves to provide sufficient food for caterpillars of the Birdwing butterfly.

Major threats

- Land clearing/urbanisation.
- Prolonged drought
- Dutchman’s pipe** – *A Fatal Attraction*. Birdwing eggs are also laid on the exotic Dutchman’s pipe vine (*Aristolochia elegans*) but the leaves are toxic and kill the larvae. This introduced pest is also common in gardens and as a weed in bushland, creating a ‘death trap’ for any larvae that hatch out to feed on the plants.

Planting Instructions. The vine -

- Grows throughout the year but is rarely fast-growing.
- Flowers Sept-Nov.
- Needs semi-shade. Feed with Osmocote © and occasionally Aquasol ©.
- Needs water frequently when first planted & keep the soil moist thereafter.
- Plant 1 m from host tree or trellis. Don’t handle roots; plant with pot soil.
- Tie a string to the stake to help the plant climb.
- Take care not to break off fragile climbing leaders.
- Grows to a height of approximately 5 m.
- Does not like fresh eucalypt

RICHMOND BIRDWING BUTTERFLY and ITS VINE


The Richmond Birdwing butterfly is one of the largest butterflies found in South East Queensland and Northern New South Wales. The female has a wingspan of 6ins and the male one of 5ins.

This beautiful butterfly, the male of which has brilliant green and black wings and bright red splash on its thorax, was once found in great numbers from the Mary River Heads in Queensland to the Clarence River in New South Wales and west to the Great Dividing Range.

Since the early 1900s, the range of the butterfly has become severely restricted. By the beginning of the 21st century, its distribution was reduced to two distinct populations, one on the Sunshine Coast and one stretching from the Gold Coast and its hinterland to the more northern parts of Northern New South Wales.

Brisbane and its environs no longer has a stable and viable Richmond Birdwing Population, although sightings are more frequent in wet weather. The population has begun to increase in recent years encouraged by a frenzy of planting activities in the Brisbane suburbs over the last two decades.

The butterfly lays its eggs exclusively on the endangered Richmond Birdwing Vine, although the introduced species Dutchman's Pipe vine, a distant relative of the

food plant, emits a substance that tricks the female butterflies into laying their eggs on this vine. It was a very popular introduced vine, planted in gardens. It is now a bushland weed.. a fatal attraction.

She lays only three yellow eggs and the emerging caterpillars fight to the death with only one surviving to mature and start the cycle once again.

A timely and significant reminder of the environmental values that are under threat and must be protected was the discovery of a thriving Richmond Birdwing Butterfly Vine (*Pararistolochia praevenosa*), estimated to be at least 200 years old! It is imperative the vines are protected and vegetation communities containing these special floral characters are rehabilitated to support the recovery of the butterfly.

Indeed, establishing a 'wildlife garden' on your property, be it large or small serves in providing a 'corridor' together with important habitat and food trees for wildlife.

It has been estimated that a planting of 30 vines would support a viable butterfly population. You and /or, you and your neighbours could band together in this endeavour and help to save our beautiful butterfly.

The Man behind the Melbourne Cup Winner

'Gerry Ryan triumphs in the Tour de Flemington'

'MAYBE there's something especially alluring about the bright lights of Paris when you've grown up selling newspapers on street corners in a country town to help keep food on a big family table..

Certainly, Gerry Ryan's sporting odyssey had a strong French flavour long before his horse Americain won the Melbourne Cup yesterday.

He has been trying for years to enable an Australian cyclist to win that country's biggest sporting event, the Tour de France, by financially helping young riders such as Cadel Evans -- who has twice gone within seconds of pulling it off - get their careers started.

At Flemington yesterday, it became a matter of "if you can't beat 'em, join 'em" when the great race got its first French connection, thanks to trainer Alain de Royer Dupre and jockey Gerald Mosse.

Needless to say, the French fizz was flow-



ing at Ryan's up-market inner-suburban pub not much later, and not just because of the \$3.6 million prizemoney he and his mate and co-owner, Kevin Bamford, had pocketed.

It was Ryan's wife Val's 60th birthday and would have been his late father Jack's 100th, and nothing could be more appropriate than that.

Jack was a battler from Bendigo who loved the

Melbourne Cup and made sure Gerry and his eight siblings gathered around the radio, and later the TV, every first Tuesday in November.

His mum Madge was a tiny punter who

rang the TAB when they put up the minimum bet and told them she was a pensioner and couldn't afford a dollar each way - so they let her continue to bet 50 cents. Val's father Benny was an SP bookie in a local pub and used to keep sweet with the cops by shouting them an annual barrel of beer.

To say Ryan has come a long way since is a huge understatement - it is the classic tale of a smart kid from a struggling background making good in a huge way. Many sports have benefited.

Ryan founded a caravan manufacturing business called Jayco, which now employs 850 people and turns over about \$250 million, while a stud farm near Nagambie is the centrepiece of a racing operation that boasts 15 broodmares and 30 horses in training, including many untested two-year-olds.

Ryan makes his presence felt at every race meeting because all jockeys have Jayco embroidered on their britches. It is just one of countless generous sponsorships and other forms of financial support he has tipped into sport over about 20 years.

As well as racing and cycling, football, rugby league, basketball, cricket, motocross and lawn bowls have all been on the receiving end.

Women's cycling pioneer Kathy Watt won an Olympic gold medal as far back as Barcelona in 1992 -- thanks to Ryan making it possible for her to train in Europe. Cycling has become a passion and he attends the Tour de France every year, where nothing excites him more than seeing one

of "his" boys, such as Melbourne rider Simon Gerrans, win a stage.

The emphasis is always on youth, and he has tipped in multiple millions to the Jayco AIS track cycling team, which he hopes will lead to young guns such as Jack Brabridge, Leigh Howard and Travis and Cameron Meyer dominating at the London Olympics.

His son Andrew, 33, Jayco's marketing director, admits he sometimes wonders about the amount that flows into sport.

"But we like to sponsor events that interest the people who work for us and when things are tough we try to help," he said. "He (Gerry) likes seeing sportsmen do well, and Australia do well at the Olympic and Commonwealth Games, that sort of thing.

"It might not be the right way to invest, but if you've got the money, why not? He does it for the athletes and the fans and he gets genuinely excited when they win."

Still, it's been a tough year.

One of Ryan's most enthusiastic involvements is St Kilda, which he has helped keep afloat - and he has had to watch them not win two AFL Grand Finals.

Worse, he was on the board of the Melbourne Storm rugby league team, stripped of two premierships when the salary cap drama exploded.

The national women's basketball team, the Jayco Opals, had their worst world championship for years and the Jayco Herald Sun bike tour didn't take place, making way for the world championship road race.

"You just have to move on," Ryan said
